Last Week's Guest Speaker: Wayne Collis

For those that can wrap their heads around the complexities of government regulations for personal investment for retirement, and even those that can't, tonight we were presented with a summary of some of the key issues we all face. These included:

1. Contribution Caps

- a. Concessional caps (Pretax) (for all ages) reduce to \$25,000 pa.
 - · No need to be substantially self-employed to claim a tax deduction
 - · From July 2018 you can carry forward any unused contributions for a rolling 5 years. Super balance must be under \$500,000

- b. Non Concessional Cap (After tax) reduces to \$100,000 from \$180.000.
 - Contributions after 1st July can be only made if account value is below \$1.6M
- 2. Transition to Retirement Allocated Pensions
- \cdot Will lose their 0% tax rate as from 1st July
- Need to look at are they still fit for purpose
- They do not form part of the \$1.6M Balance Transfer Cap.
- 3. Balance Transfer Caps
- \$1.6M is the maximum that can be placed into a Pension account.
- Defined Benefit pensions are calculated first (lifelong pensions are calculated at 16 times annual income)
- · Amounts above this must be transferred back to accumulation

phase or taken out as a lump sum / income payment.

4. Transitional CGT Relief

- Every asset can have their individual cost base reset with an election prior the lodgment date of the super fund.
- Only funds that are affected by the changes can use this relief.
 - a. Segregated assets
- · Individual assets will be reset if current value is higher
- · Issues can arise if selling within a 12-month period
 - b. Non-segregated
 - Need to proportion asset across both pension and accumulation funds
 - Deemed disposal will have a tax event for accumulation portion
 - Tax can be paid now or when the asset is sold, however long that is. No interest is paid or indexation of this tax bill.

Things to consider

- Would the client pay tax in the future if the reset wasn't elected?
- Time frame for selling the asset (less than 12 months due to 1/3 discount)

5. Anti-Detriment Payment

• From 1st July 2017 antidetriment payments are unavailable.

Portfolio Construction for Retirees

1. Cash – 12 months' worth of income in cash to cover your income requirements.

- 2. Term Deposits 2 to 3 years worth on income. This is a safety net for when the market crashes.
- 3. Income Stock this is to maximise the long-term income generation of your portfolio. All income is to be paid into the cash account.
- 4. Long Term Investments This can be anything from Property, shares or private equity.

By having investments split up under your superannuation fund, you have the ability whilst the markets are crashing, not to sell down crystallising those losses for income payments.

Dr Charles H. Mayo was an honorary member of the Rotary Club Rochester, Minnesota USA.

Charles, together with his brother William, led the development of the Mayo Clinic into a world-renowned centre of medical treatment and research.
