Last Week's Guest Speaker

We were treated to a presentation by one of the 'family' of Strathfield Rotary, Camille Kafka (née Erskine), accompanied by her husband, Radim, and mother

Camille started dancing as a six-year-old. By the age of 10, her family moved to Strathfield, where she attended School at Santa Sabina. Her ambition to develop as a dancer called strongly, and she convinced her mother to send her to McDonald College. She started there in year eight and completed year 12 exams as dux of the college in 1999. To further develop her career, she sought and was accepted into the National Ballet School in New Zealand. This stage of her development was supported by Strathfield Rotary. Over a period of three years, studying and dancing six days a week, she successfully completed the course. During that time the connection to Rotary continued because in the last year of the course Camille stayed with a Rotarian family in Wellington.

In early January 2003, whilst looking to further her ballet career, Camille landed in Europe and auditioned for a number of ballet troupes. The competition was intense as there were sometimes hundreds of applicants for each position. Her desire and hard work paid off when the Czech ballet in Prague offered her a contract on the same day she auditioned.

This new chapter in her life lasted for over seven years. Moving halfway around the world, to a country where English was not spoken and where the weather was certainly nothing that she had experienced in Australia, was quite daunting. However Camille rose to the challenge and forged herself a successful career in her newly adopted country. Whilst it was a culture shock, the Czech Republic was one that much very appreciated the arts, particularly ballet. As well as learning a new language, and landing roles in a number of performances, she also landed herself a partner. Camille was married in 2009. With her new husband, who was also involved in ballet, they moved to Brno in the Czech Republic, where they remained for another five years.


Injuries and wear-and-tear on the body are an issue in ballet, and the medical setup for dancers in the Czech Republic was not as good as it is in other countries. The effects of the rigors of dancing did take their toll on her body, and Camille decided to retire in June 2015. Upon telling the ballet troupe of her decision, they she was told the troupe was actually about to offer her an extension to her contract. However, her mind was made up, and in August 2015 Camille and her husband moved to Australia.

Never one to stand still, Camille had commenced an arts/law degree from UNE whilst in the Czech Republic. She continued with the arts portion of the degree on her return and will complete this soon. Not surprisingly, Camille has also turned her attention to teaching the next generation of ballet dancers. It was a pleasure for the Club to hear Camille, a person of great energy and enthusiasm, speak and to hear her give appreciation to the role that Rotary has played in her life

Rotary Celebrities and Projects

Margaret Thatcher, the <u>Prime Minister of the United Kingdom</u> from 1979 to 1990, received a Paul Harris Fellowship in 1995. Mrs. Thatcher was an honorary Rotarian.

The Rotary Club of Burwood used to be called 'The Home of The Community Chest'.

The Community Chest was set up to provide community benefits on a local and global level. 51 percent of the Chest income remained in the country and the remaining 49 percent was earmarked for overseas aid.

Twice a year, the Community Chest creator/manager Walter Bock would organise a cement mixer to mix the hundreds of kilos of Community Chest tickets to find the winner of the car prize.

From its inception in 1992 until the project was taken over by the Rotary Club of Holroyd in 2011, the Rotary Club of Burwood raised some \$14.5 million at a rate of about \$20k per week. This supported projects within Australia and some 614 international projects to the value of approx.. \$9 million, including contributions from AusAID etc., What a wonderful achievement by Walter Bock and the Rotary Club of Burwood.
