At club level, I would like to extend a special thanks to Don Killip for his untiring work in our fund raising activities. Thanks to Don, we have had a record year in this area. Thanks are also due to our Sgt-at-arms George, who kept us amused but broke during the year, to Gary Kerr (Bulletin editor) who kept us informed and to Harley Tarrant (Programme Chairman) who kept up the supply of guest speakers.

Congratulations are extended to our own David Croft who had the distinction of being chosen as team leader for the G.S.E. Team to visit New Brunswick (Canada) earlier this year.

Finally, as I said earlier in this report, it is perhaps more fitting if we each reconsider our own committment to Ed Cadman's theme, "You are the Key" and if, being honest with ourself, we have to admit that we could have done betterthen let us not dwell too much on what we failed to accomplish but aspire to the ideal that in Rotary lies hope and that, with a firmer resolve, we can achieve in the future that which we have hoped for, but failed to achieve, in the past, and so make the forthcoming year a truly memorable one for Terry and his team.
